
us. Our hearts cry out for that resurrection theme. It has been indelibly etched on our hearts by the hand of Him Who created us.

Caring for the orphans and widows came at a high cost; Jesus was soon to face verbal abuse, a beating, and death on a cross. He knew the fear his disciples would face without someone to be their friend and advocate. But Jesus had a plan to 'come to them' through His Holy Spirit.

My 89 year old, widowed, motherin-law, battling COPD, has been in inhome hospice care for the last two

FWF 2014 Project Updates Families Without Fathers





Everyday throughout the year we are given a tremendous opportunity to help the hurting here in Thailand through Families Without Fathers (FWF). The past six years has been a remarkable testimony of lives that are being changed.

For chldren and young people like Teda age 14, the weekly visits to their homes and area schools is making a difference. Each visit includes a brief interview where prayer is offered and often times the scriptures are shared. This helps us to get to know each family in a personal way. We learn about their history, their disappointments, their hopes and dreams. We learn, too, about some of the needs of each family, we ask God and look for ways to help. Over the past six years, approx 80% of these children have come to Christ, having been water baptized and are in church regularly. Presently there are 86 children from fatherless homes in 6 locations across Thailand being reached.

A major part of the mission of FWF is to provide a level of financial assistance with: School fees, related supplies, transportation costs to and from school. These fees are paid out twice a year for every child involved in the program in May and in October. Some familes receive a small bag of food each month: Breakfast drinks. eggs, cooking oil, dried noodle packs, soap and shampoo.

Right now each of our Firstlight Area Teams are putting together the numbers to reach 100 kids in 2014. That's our goal.

We are going to need to see the Lord's provision of \$18,000.00 to make that happen. You can help by sending a special financial gift today to support FWF in 2014. Please do what you can to help.

P.U.S.H.

Sometime over the past three years I heard someone use this phrase: P.U.S.H. Pray Until Something Happens. "What a statement" I said to myself. "I am going to use this someday" I further added, and "I am going to make this a reality in my life."

You see, the scriptures are full of examples of those who did just that. Prayed Until Something Happened. Elijah confronting the prophets of Baal on mount carmel the God who answers by fire, let Him be God. And so it was. The early church in Acts chapter 12 - Peter was kept in prison and the church prayed fervently (v.5), they prayed until Peter was released and came looking for them knocking at the door. They prayed until something happened! They prayed until Peter was released.

Jesus' example of the unrighteous judge in Luke chapter 18 was to teach us that man ought always to pray and not to lose heart. In other words: Pray Until Something Happens. In that story, the unrighteous judge did not fear God nor did he respect men. checkouts in grocery stores and watched in horror as a Chinese tourist got pushy with the little, young cashier. Inevitably, that cashier would work SLOWER to teach her impatient customer to calm down.

Always with a smile, they extend patience freely often times when I need it most. Whew! Face saved!
